

### **LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT - JULY 2021**

As we hold our 10th AGM, I'm constantly amazed at the resilience of the VTL, which is all due to the members, volunteers, and wider community that we've been a part of over the last decade. It's wonderful to be a part of such a group, and I'm truly privileged to be a board member. It goes without saying that this has been a challenging year for everyone, and we are fortunate that we have been able to keep our doors open.

Despite the pandemic, or perhaps because of it, the VTL has actually had an excellent year. With almost 800 active members, we've never been busier - something our shop volunteers can attest to, I'm sure. While we were not yet able to restart our popular workshops, the increase in memberships, some very successful garage sales, and a huge number of rentals have demonstrated the strength and value of our organization.



A major focus of the board's work this year has been a concerted effort to develop a formal anti-racism strategy for the VTL. Trades, DIY, maker, and home improvement spaces are



traditionally very white and male centric spaces, and we want to ensure the VTL has an active role in opening its doors to a wider community, and to make it safe and welcoming to all. Over the last nine months, the board has been developing an inclusive and anti-racist vision for the VTL, creating short, mid, and long-term action items so that our organization can better serve our community. The steps we've taken are just the beginning of our journey, and I'm excited to see what the coming years bring.

As always, the board and I would like to extend a huge thanks to Laine Hughes, who does a phenomenal job at keeping our co-op running so smoothly. To the volunteers who donate so many of their evenings and weekends to running the shop - you're the reason we're able to do this, and we can't thank you enough. A huge thanks to Rob Gill, who's coming up to his third year as our "interim" bookkeeper, and to the rest of our board - Monica, Leah, Jacob, Liza, Matt, and Silas - you've been a pleasure to work with this year.

### **TOOL REPORT - JULY 2021**

Over the past year our inventory at the VTL has been carefully grown thanks to the incredibly generous donations made by many individuals, and the addition of new purchases overseen by our Board of Directors. It has been better classified through the efforts of our inventory specialist Karen who spent her days off at the shop, knee-deep in the catalogue running down tools and keeping our inventory as current as possible. And our well loved collection has been maintained and kept in good repair by fix-it specialist Enoth.



Alongside countless individual donations, several major donations happened again this year, and we continue to be in awe of just how giving people can be. We were lucky to have a large surplus of donated items and for this reason held our most successful yard sale to date. The sheer volume of donations given to us then enabled us to donate tools to our friends starting up new libraries in other communities, and to pass the love along. Tool donations are a huge component of our capacity for connecting members with what they need to complete projects large and small, and we are so grateful for the many useful items that find their way into our catalogue.

A huge thanks to all our volunteers who made extra efforts to clean and sanitize the tools coming and going this year, to ensure that we were operating safely and in a sustainable

way. Gratitude as well to our members who take special care to bring things back to us in even better shape than they got them, and to those who let us know when things aren't working well, and what we can improve on!!

### VTL by the Numbers:

In our 10 amazing years of existence, more than 3500 people have joined our co-op and completed over 80,000 borrows! A very special benchmark was achieved in 2021, as we dramatically exceeded our previous high for most active members and hit 815!! This year we've lent out 1460 tools, for a total of nearly 11,000 loans to our many incredible members.
