OUR VOLUNTEERS AND STAFF

The VTL has had a busy year of positive development thanks to our staff and volunteers. General Manager Greg Stone has contributed greatly to shop improvements and continues to support the hard working group of volunteers who keep the shop doors open and tools working. As of the end of the fiscal year, we have once again increased our volunteer count. There are currently 30 volunteers working behind the shop desk, running workshops, helping with committees and maintaining tools.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND COORDINATORS

The Board of Directors is an elected group of volunteers responsible for the long-term vision of the VTL. "Coordinators" have been incorporated to fulfill a more active role in the shop's day-to-day operations and are to report to the Board. This new structure aims to strengthen and maintain a long-term Board of Directors and provide fresh energy and ideas at the Coordinator level. Earlier this year, a Board retreat was held on Salt Spring Island. The retreat is where much of the strategic planning is done for the upcoming year.

COMMITTEES

Currently, three committees are active at the VTL. The Tool Coordinator continues to run a monthly tool committee where much of the tool maintenance occurs. The Tiny Workshop Committee is in the initial phases of planning for a tiny mobile VTL workshop. The Safer Spaces committee is working on developing policy that will make the shop more accessible to all members of the community.

SHOP VOLUNTEERS

The Shop Assistants and Supervisor volunteers continue to be the steady pulse of the VTL, providing friendly assistance for their fellow members. In return for their services, shop volunteers continue to receive discounts on borrowing fees and workshops. The refined Volunteer Training Program has seen great success and a Supervisor Training Program is now being developed. In the next year, the VTL hopes to increase education and training opportunities, in the form of seminars, for shop volunteers in various relevant spheres from tool maintenance to safer spaces policy.

PARTNERSHIPS

Over the course of the last year, the VTL has made a lot of new friends. These partnerships are very important for the VTL. Cross-pollinating is helps us collaborate and come up with great new ideas and initiatives. Here are some of our new and old friends.

ANOTHER SPACE

The VTL and Another Space have gotten really close this year! Another Space is a site for workshops to serve your personal growth, healing and exploration. Since the fall of 2015, VTL and AS have been co-hosting monthly Drop-In Sewing workshops. These workshops are an opportunity for people to come and learn how to sew from nothing, or to get help from specialists with their textile projects. The workshops have been really popular and even garnered a segment on CTV news. The VTL would also like to thank AS for hosting our AGM this year!

WOOD SHOP WORKER'S COOP

Early in 2016, the VTL started talking with the Wood Shop Worker's Coop, a very cool organization based in False Creek Flats. The Wood Shop is an upcycling machine, offering furniture and lumber from various sources of upcycled materials; pallets, box springs, and home demos all included. The VTL wanted to make it easier for our members to get access to the Wood Shop's upcycled lumber for projects. We're happy to say that VTL members get 20% off lumber from Wood Shop. We're also in talks to cohost workshops and to offer furniture 'kits' to our members for a discounted rate.

CEDAR COTTAGE NEIGHBOURHOOD HOUSE

The Cedar Cottage Neighbourhood House is one of VTL's oldest partners, and we're still going strong! Located on Victoria Dr, the CCNH is a gathering place for Cedar Cottage community members of all ages, cultures and walks of life. The VTL got the opportunity to help out with a few CCNH events this year. First, we hosting a small box-building workshop for a group of girls in the After-School Program. Everyone finished their boxes! And we helped CCNH prepare for their annual Carnival fundraiser by assisting them with signage, promotion and some upgrades to their mini-putt course.

THE URBAN NESTWORK

The Urban Nestwork is a new organization that aims to assist urban biodiversity! They host birdhouse-building workshops, organize seminars on biodiversity, and sell birdhouses. VTL has been providing tools for the Urban Nestwork's workshops, and they'll be hosting birdhouse-building workshops with the VTL in the near future. Check out their 'Nestwork' on their website, a map that displays all of their birdhouses throughout the city!

TOOL REPORT

The tools at the VTL experienced a first for 2015-16 – a starring role in our "Tools for Fall" short film. Our red rake and Skil drill managed to stay grounded and didn't make extensive demands. The bike on the other hand took the elevated status literally and demanded to be stored at the highest point in the shop. Check out the film on our website or youtube channel. You can also come and take home these stars – they will be happy to help you rake leaves, drill holes or carry a 400lb load under pedal power.

This year the tool committee has been re-established and now meets on the last Monday of every month. Additionally, the tool committee is inviting any member to drop-in and help keep the tools in operation. This has led to a larger engagement with our members as well as more hands on deck to work on the tools.

As with last year, shop organization has been a priority. The shop shelving is largely completed now and we have begun utilizing the vertical space in the shop for more seasonal items such as the lawn mowers. More work will be done on the hanging tools over the coming months. Although not strictly shop organization, some effort was put forth to give the front desk area more character with the addition of wood panelling from reclaimed sources such as cedar fencing and pallet wood.

For the second year in a row we held a spring garage sale. This event was wildly successful in terms of disposing responsibly of tools that were no longer required in the shop as well as being a kick-off to the spring busy season. The garage sale day is one of our busiest for loans and new members.

Here's a few stats from the year:

- Over 1100 unique tools checked
- 612 members took out at least one tool
- Over 9000 loan transactions
- Most loaned tool: Dewalt 10in table saw

WORKSHOPS AND EVENTS

This year, the VTL offered an array of workshops to members and the community, and participated in some great events. Here's a summary of everything we did.

WORKSHOPS

Intro to Tools

Our monthly Intro to Tools workshop was very successful this year. The demand for basic woodworking instruction is high, with every Intro to Tools class being nearly sold out. Some of the projects we worked on this year were ladders, lunch boxes, bird houses, hexagonal shelves and planter boxes. Our GM Greg Stone is the host of this workshop.

Drop-in Sewing

Along with Another Space, the VTL has been offering a monthly drop-in sewing event. Participants can come and learn from our on-hand textile experts, or just use our machines to work on their projects. The VTL is pleased to be engaging in the world of textiles, new territory for us. Thanks to hosts Sarah Kerfoot, Linnea McPhail, and the Another Space crew.

Bike Maintenance

This year, we offered a 7-part bike maintenance workshop series. Cycling guru Ari Ng instructed participants how to maintain all the individual parts of their bikes.

Ski and Snowboard Tuning

This winter, we offered two workshops focused on keeping your skis and snowboards tuned. Former Olympian and snowboarder Alex Duckworth has been an amazing host for these events. We hope to keep this going next winter.

Miscellaneous

Alongside our recurring workshops, we also hosted numerous one-off workshops, including planter boxes (hosted by Jillian Papp), box-building with Cedar Cottage Neighbourhood House, and mini-putt upgrading at Charles Dicken Elementary.

EVENTS

The VTL was involved in several events this past year. Once again, we were present at the Vancouver Mini MakerFaire, where we showcased our members' projects and offered participants to build their own growler carriers. We also hosted our now-annual Garage Sale. This event is a great fundraiser, while helping us clear out some space in our shop and drawing some new members to the VTL.
